The Deland Naval Air Station Museum Remembers William Joshua "Bill" Dreggors









With great sadness, the DeLand Naval Air Station Museum Volunteers grieve the loss of William Joshua "Bill" Dreggors who passed away on February 3, 2017 at the age of 90. Bill was a WWII United States Navy Veteran who served on the USS Midway.

He was a founding member of the DeLand Naval Air Station Museum 22 years ago and served as President, Historian and a Board Director for many years. We send our most heartfelt condolences to his loving wife Irene, son and daughter-in-law Wayne and Leah Dreggors and the entire Dreggors Family. Our condolences also to the West Volusia Historical Society

where Bill retired as Executive Director Emeritus after 43 years of service to DeLand, Volusia County and the State of Florida.

Bill was a DeLand native. After his service in the Navy, he made a career with the Florida Power Corporation for 42 years. He was a lifelong collector of electrical memorabilia and his amazing collection can be viewed at Bill Dreggors Park inside the DeLand Memorial Hospital and Military Museum. The "Ice & Electric" Exhibit features the glow of the first street lights in 1897 as the City of DeLand enjoyed the first electrical system in the State of Florida. This exhibit is one of only a very few electrical museums in the United States. Among the very rare artifacts are vintage photographs depicting the areas ice and electric business as well as a variety of early tools, equipment and appliances. Also displayed is an outstanding collection of rare insulators know once as the "jewels of the wire". These insulators range from every shape and size and every color of the rainbow. Anyone lucky enough to have received a personnel tour of the display with Bill Dreggors remembers how he could give a complete description of each item in the display. He would also share his narrow escape with death when, as a Florida Power Lineman, he received an almost fatal shock while working high on an electric pole but was rescued by co-workers in time.

After his retirement from the Florida Power Corporation, Bill began his second career as a Folk Historian. He was passionate and committed to the preservation of our local history. His enthusiasm for history was contagious and he was able to inspire so many community members, both adults and youth, to engage in historic preservation by volunteering their time and resources to continue documenting our rich and unique history.

Bill Dreggors portrayed many historical characters over the years, but he was best known for his character role of DeLand's Founder, Henry A. DeLand. Other characters he portrayed included Seth French, Sheriff Ed Stone, Frederick DeBary, and one of his favorite, Santa Claus. Bill was Santa Claus for many children's events. He often recalled one young boy who came to see Santa with a bit of skepticism. He spent extra time talking to the boy who then asked if he could touch Santa's beard. The boy gave the beard a tug and as he left the stage he was heard telling other children waiting in line "He's the real deal"!

The history preservation accomplishments of William J. "Bill" Dreggors, including the many videos and displays he helped to establish, will impact the West Volusia Historical Society, the City of DeLand, the County of Volusia and the State of Florida for generations. Bill was awarded many local and statewide honors and the appreciation and respect for him from our community could never be stated enough. Bill knew that he was just a temporary caretaker of our past history and the history that we are making each day. His tireless efforts to instill the importance of preservation in others will be passed on to future generations and we can thank Bill Dreggors for giving us the foundation and inspiration to continue his life's work. We owe him a great debt of gratitude and will continue to honor and protect the legacy he has placed in the hands of the next generation.

We will miss his gentle demeanor, southern accent, his great stories and his sense of humor. He was our friend and mentor and we were proud to know him. He will always be honored and remembered at the DeLand Naval Air Station Museum.

















Dear Mr. Dreggors,
